




Households: Existing vs New

■ Existing ■ New




Household: Types



EMPLOYMENT AS MAIN SOURCE OF INCOME

For the first time, there was a significant increase in the number of food bank clients who reported employment as their main source of income. The percentage of clients who reported employment as their main source of income increased from 23 per cent in 2021 to 28 per cent in 2022. Low wages or not enough hours became the number one reason for accessing our food bank. The national average of clients who reported employment as their main source of income was 14 per cent in 2022, which was an increase from 12.5 per cent in 2021.


According to Statistics Canada, the lowest income quintile saw their disposable incomes decline by 7.5 per cent in the first quarter of 2022 compared to the previous year. Before the pandemic, the majority of households nationwide whose incomes were within this quintile were already spending more than 50 per cent of their income on rent and utilities. The 71 per cent of PFB clients who live in market rental housing were particularly affected. Massive increases in the costs of core items like food, rent, and fuel mean a proportionately much larger share of income would go to paying for these essential items.

UNCHARTED TERRITORY

Historically, food bank usage closely mirrored unemployment rates. As we enter this uncharted territory of record-high usage and unemployment rates sitting at historic lows, work must be done on two fronts to end hunger once and for all. First, we need to ensure that people who are experiencing food insecurity are given access to sufficient, safe, and nutritious food as soon as possible. Second, we must work toward an improved social safety net that includes better income supports to prevent more people from falling into poverty in the first place.

In 2022 Parkland Food Bank was able to directly support 1,704 unique households (4,588 unique individuals) through our Monthly Hamper, Top Up Hamper, and H2 Hamper Programs.

When we total the number of visits to our hamper programs, we provided an average of 5 days' worth of food to 28,266 individuals.

HAMPER OPTIONS

MONTHLY HAMPER

8,835 Monthly Hampers were distributed in 2022.

Appointment Only

Once every calendar month, clients can access a Monthly Hamper. This hamper consists of non-perishable pantry items, meat, eggs, and milk. Items available through the fresh food program are also included with this hamper.

Gluten Free non-perishable food boxes are also available with the Monthly Hamper Program.

Core Monthly Hamper food items provided in 2022 were:

- \$662,000 worth of pantry items
- \$168,000 worth of meat
- \$39,000 worth of eggs
- \$48,000 worth of milk
- Other dairy (yogurt, cheese etc.)
- Fresh Fruit and Vegetables
- Bread, Buns, Specialty Breads, Pastry
- Miscellaneous Frozen Goods
- Paper products (toilet paper, paper towel)
- Personal Hygiene Products (toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, body wash, soap)
- Baby Products (diapers, baby food, formula)
- Household Products (laundry detergent, dish soap, cleaning supplies)



HAMPER OPTIONS

TOP-UP HAMPER

1,518 Top-Up Hampers were distributed in 2022.

Drop-In

Once every calendar month, clients can access a Top-Up Hamper in addition to the Monthly Hamper.

This hamper consists of all 'shopping' items in the front reception area:

- Specialty Breads
- Cooler and Freezer Items
- Feminine Hygiene
- Baby Supplies

H2 HAMPER

325 H2 Hampers were distributed in 2022.

Drop-In

For clients that do not have access to refrigeration or cooking facilities, we have our H2 Hampers available. These hampers can be accessed once a week, are sized to fit in a large backpack and consist of all ready to eat foods that require no meal preparation.




SUPPORT FREQUENCY

The purpose of Parkland Food Bank is to address food insecurity among residents of Spruce Grove, Stony Plain and Parkland County; Individuals and families in Emergency, Short Term, Medium Term and Long Term Need.


Over the last five years we have seen a shift where households required more frequent support, moving from 20% of households needing Medium to Long Term Assistance in 2018 to 73% in 2022.



Parkland Food Bank simply reflects the generosity of our community as it receives 100% of the funds and food it takes to operate, from individuals, businesses, and organizations from within the Tri-Region. We categorize food received under Community Food Donations, Food Rescue and Purchased Food.

DONATION TYPES

Community Food Donations:

In 2022 the community donated over 149,438 kg of food valued at over \$850,000. We truly appreciate those who took the time to select and purchase much needed food for the community.

Food Rescue:


Is a program that collects all surplus food from grocery stores, food distributors, and restaurants and redirects it to highest and best use. Through Food Rescue, 275,137 kg valued at over \$1.5 million was diverted from the landfill in 2022.

Purchased Food

To provide a consistent and balanced hamper of both perishable and non-perishable food, Parkland Food Bank purchased over \$420,000 worth of food in 2022. This included milk, meat, eggs, produce and non-perishable items.



Yearly Food in kg

We were able to complete a food bank facility expansion in 2015-2016 doubling our facility size from 3000 sq ft to 6000 sq ft. (a 100% increase)

In the last 10 years our hamper program has grown by 296% and we are processing 464% more food through that facility. We once again find that our current space is not large enough to house the food needed to meet monthly demands
